Xenophobia and Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy in the Current U.S. Context

Event Description: Fringe movements and mainstream political parties have framed immigrants and refugees as the major cause of unemployment, crime, and a threat to their cultural and social fabric, unearthing a collective anxiety about the browning of the U.S. Beginning in early 2017, Donald Trump's policies of heightened policing of Black and Brown people, deporting unauthorized immigrants and separating children from parents, constructing a wall at the U.S. Southern border, and banning the entry of people from six predominantly Muslim countries has made explicit the connection between racism and xenophobia in the U.S. Despite policies that seem alarming to many of us, we remain a nation that is largely apathetic or numb to the dehumanization of racial minority immigrants and their children.

Presenter: Usha Tummala-Narra, PhD

Usha Tummala-Narra, PhD, is an Associate Professor in the Counseling, Developmental & Educational Psychology department at Boston College. She conducts research on mental health and trauma within immigrant communities, focusing her work on cultural competence in psychotherapy. Her expertise includes areas of immigration, race, gender, interpersonal and collective trauma, and culturally informed psychoanalytic psychotherapy. A licensed psychologist and co-author of dozens of books and journals, Tummala-Narra has lent her expertise to NPR, NBC News, Al Jazeera America and many other outlets. She currently serves on three editorial boards: the Asian American Journal of Psychology, Psychoanalytic Psychology of Men and Masculinity.
