Deputized: ¿Cómo Pudo Pasar?

Deputized is a feature length documentary film that examines a hate crime that resulted in the murder of Ecuadorian immigrant Marcelo Lucero. Filmed over three years, the film explores the local and national forces that came together to create an atmosphere of anti-immigrant hatred. The film investigates this story from multiple perspectives, exploring the role of the police who mishandled cases, the school that ignored tensions, the press that sensationalized the issue, the politicians who use the issue to get elected and the justice system that needed a scapegoat. Interviews with local politicians, clergy, immigrants, parents and the main perpetrator try to explain how this very American tragedy could happen.

This year's Reel Thinking series will focus on American and International films with themes of racism, institutional racism, and social trauma. Discussion will focus on psychosocial, cultural, and psychoanalytic perspectives that are helpful in clinical settings, including psychotherapy, and in overcoming conscious and unconscious biases.

Dr. Andres J. Pumariega has devoted his over 40-year career in psychiatry and child/adolescent psychiatry to children's systems of care and cultural diversity in mental health. He is currently Professor and Chief, Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Department of Psychiatry, University of Florida College of Medicine and UF Health. He received his M.D. from the University of Miami School of Medicine and residency and fellowship in general and child psychiatry at Duke University Medical Center. He previously headed two pediatric psychiatry consultation-liaison services, three directorships of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, and chaired three departments of psychiatry. He also headed the ETSU Center of Excellence for Children in State Custody, awarded the American Psychiatric Association's Silver Award for Outstanding Service (2004). He is a Distinguished Life Fellow

of the American Psychiatric Association (APA) and the Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP), and Fellow of the American College of Psychiatrists and American Orthopsychiatric Association. He has served as Associate Editor of Adolescent Psychiatry, American Journal of Orthopsychiatry and the Journal of Child and Family Studies, and on the Editorial Board of Community Mental Health Journal. He co-led the drafting of the CMHS Cultural Competence Standards (1999), the AACAP Practice Parameters for Community Systems of Care (2007), and Practice Parameters for Culturally Competent Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Care (2013). He served as President of the American Orthopsychiatric Association (2010-2012) and the American Association of Social Psychiatry (2013-2015). He was the founding Chair, Work Group on Systems of Care (1994- 2001), and Co-Chair, Committee on Diversity and Culture (2007-2015) in the AACAP; and Chair, Committee on Hispanic Psychiatrists (2006-2009) of the APA. Dr. Pumariega has received numerous awards, including the APA's Simon Bolivar Award and Lecture in Hispanic Psychiatry (2004), and the AACAP's Jeanne Spurlock Award and Lecture on Diversity and Culture (2007).
